



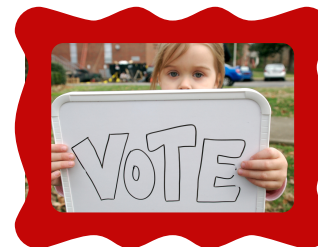

When George Washington was elected President of the U.S., only 6% of the population was able to vote. Voting laws have changed to include more citizens regardless of race and gender.













WHAT IT TAKES TO BE PRESIDENT

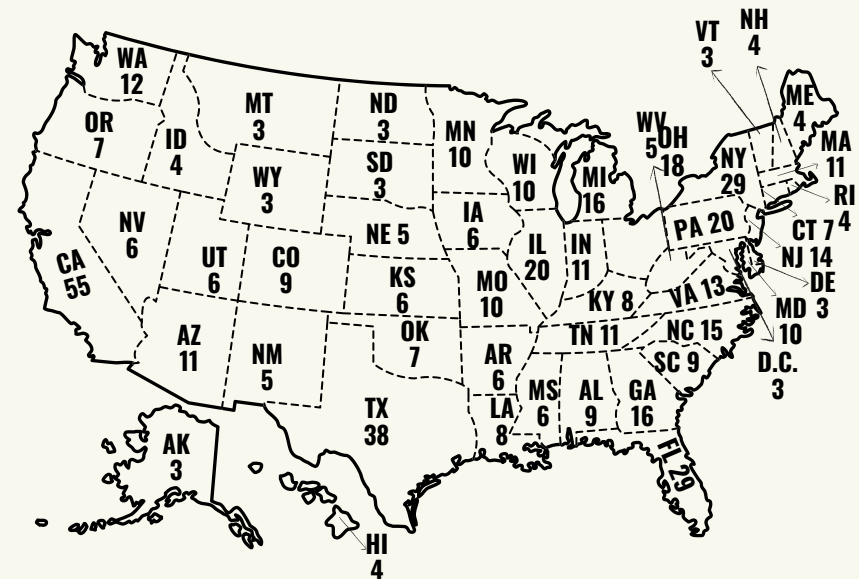
ELECTORAL COLLEGE

The Electoral College, a chosen group of citizens, makes the final vote for President. There are a total of 538 electors across the United States. A candidate needs a total 270 Electoral Votes to win the Presidency. Below is a map showing each state and the number of Electoral Votes they are assigned.

1) Watch the election with your family.

2) Track the number of Electoral Votes for each state and track the votes according to the candidates.

3) Total the votes to determine who has won the Election!
